Aussie Ark is NSW's largest independently owned and operated conservation organisation and is home to seven keystone species once found in the Barrington Tops of NSW. The vision of Aussie Ark is to establish a robust insurance population of Australian threatened, native mammal species such as the Tasmanian devil, Eastern quoll and Long-nosed potoroo, suitable for semi-wild release into large, predator-proof fenced sanctuaries in the Barrington Tops, for eventual reintroduction to the wild. We remain committed to saving the Tasmanian devil from extinction and now can apply this experience in building robust insurance populations to other Australian species in need.

Our core activities include building insurance populations, fire management, feral cat & fox exclusion, feral herbivore control, weed eradication, bush rejuvenation, field science programs, rewilding and wildlife translocations. In fact, we are the first conservation organisation to initiate a war on weeds, one that we will WIN! In addition to this, we are also the only organisation dedicating to restoring the flora and fauna of the Great Dividing Range, back to its pre-European settlement state.

Aussie Ark is committed to creating real outcomes and allocating donation funds to direct conservation. Currently, 80% of Aussie Ark employees work on-the-ground within Aussie Ark sanctuaries and insurance populations. This maximises the outcomes for our wildlife and projects ensuring best bang for buck in conservation value.

MANAGING DIRECTOR REPORT

Over the last decade I have watched in awe as Aussie Ark has grown in leaps and bounds. I have witnessed first-hand what a crazy amount of passion, drive and grit can do for native wildlife in Australia. For 10 years, I have worked alongside the team at Aussie Ark to create truly outstanding results. We have battled bushfires, floods, global crisis', lockdowns and so much more – yet our mission remains steadfast, to provide a long-term future for Australia's wildlife.

The last 12 months have provided its fair share of setbacks and hold ups, yet through it all the Ark has seen incredible growth and that is with thanks to our wildly committed team and community of supporters.

During the 2020 - 2021 financial year, Aussie Ark was BUSY! We've purchased land, forged new partnerships, returned animals back to the wild, opened sanctuaries, planted trees, bred endangered wildlife and so much more.

We hit some huge milestones, including the return of the Tasmanian devil to mainland Australia for the first time in 3,000 years. 28 adult devils were released into Aussie Arks Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary in October 2020. We were thrilled to be joined by wildlife enthusiasts Chris Hemsworth and Elsa Pataky to mark the occasion. Aussie Ark's Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary is a 400-hectare, predator free sanctuary that has been designed to replicate the wild – meaning that the devils released are just that...WILD! They maintain their natural instincts and have become the apex predator within the sanctuary.

We saw the birth of 157 endangered species – including the first devil joeys born in the wild landscape of the Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary. This achievement is particularly notable as it illustrates the success of wildlife sanctuaries like ours within the conservation toolbox.

This past year, Aussie Ark has partnered with some incredible new organisations including Volkswagen Group Australia, Coles, WildArk and WIRES! Together with these organisations and our existing partnerships we have taken on new species and projects - including the purchase of 1500 hectares of bushland in the Richmond Valley region. The site, named Mongo valley Wildlife Sanctuary, is set to become a haven for native wildlife - removing feral predators, managing noxious weeds and working reduce the risk of intense bushfires on the site. The sanctuary will mimic the success of the Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary and allows Aussie Ark to expand our umbrella of protection. We couldn't be more excited to watch as it returns to life and begins teeming with wildlife from the ground up.

We know that the world has been still for so long now and are grateful that amongst the uncertainty of it all, we have been able to continue delivering. Our focus has never faded and we are immensely grateful for the continuous support of our partners Rewild, Foundation for Australia's Most Endangered (FAME), Australian Reptile Park (ARP), Australian Geographic (AG), Glencore, Ellerston Station, Sydney Helicopters, NSW Government, Symbio Wildlife Park, Zoo Zurich, Zoo Leipzig and Pairi Daiza. I look forward to continuing this journey together and know that we can create magic together.

I want to finish by saying thank you to my team. Committed, passionate, driven, and steadfast, are all words I would use to describe each of you. It is through the dedication of our team, that I know we can leave a world to our children that they can be proud of. A world rich in biodiversity.

FOUNDING DIRECTORS REPORT

When I wrote this very same report for the 2019 - 2020 Annual Report and spoke of the challenges our world faced, I never quite imagined that 12 months later I would be writing this report once again and we would be facing the same challenges. However, despite it all, the chaos, the uncertainty, and the fear, I have watched on in pride as Aussie Ark has continued to deliver in the face of adversity.

Despite the challenges faced over the last 12 months, Aussie Ark has had some truly wonderful successes. We have filled our Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary with an abundance of Australian wildlife - including returning the Tasmanian devil to a wild space on mainland Australia for the first time in 3,000 years. We returned platypus back to their streams, after months of rehabilitation post bushfires. Our team onsite have waged a war on the noxious weed scotch broom, removing 37 hectares of the weed and allowing for native flora species to thrive. We have expanded our umbrella of protection through the purchase of thousands of hectares of land fit for rewilding and welcomed new species on board the Ark.

All of this played out as we watched 157 joeys born into the Aussie Ark program.

I couldn't be prouder of the organisation Aussie Ark has become, and as I sit here and reflect on all that Aussie Ark has achieved in the last 10 years, I know that the future of native Australian wildlife is in good hands.

As always, my thanks must go out to our community of supporters, who have believed in Aussie Ark since day one and of course to our incredible partners. Rewild, Australian Reptile Park,FAME, Symbio Wildlife Park, Australian Geographic, Glencore Ellerston, Sydney Helicopters, WIRES, WildArk, Pairi Daiza, Zoo Leipzig, Zoo Zurich, Volkswagen Group Australia, and Coles. It is only through the support of many that Aussie Ark is able to continue working for Australia's most vulnerable – so thank you.





JOEYS

As of the date of this report, confirmed is a total of 157 joeys were born at Aussie Ark during the 2021 breeding season;



The 2020 – 2021 financial year, followed a time of devastating loss and uncertainty. The bushfire disaster of 2019/2020 was very much at the forefront of the Australian public and the floods and covid 19 pandemic that followed provided their own set of challenges.

Thankfully during this time Aussie Ark was able to continue delivering outcomes for native Australian wildlife. Including returning 6 platypus back to the wild following months of rehabilitation after bushfire.

Aussie Ark also secured two new properties, totalling 1750 hectares, in the Barrington Tops and Richmond Valley regions. The properties are both set to become new wildlife sanctuaries and host the return of a suite of native fauna. Works are underway on Mongo Valley Wildlife Sanctuary, in Upper Mongogarie. With Curricabark Wildlife Sanctuary in the Barrington Tops to follow shortly thereafter.

The property set to become Curricabark Wildlife Sanctuary was purchased following a successful crowdfunding campaign, in which \$60,000 was raised by our community to help Aussie Ark secure the land.

Historically, Aussie Ark returned the Tasmanian devil to mainland Australia for the first time in 3,000 years. The occasion was celebrated by the team at Aussie Ark, our partners Rewild and WildArk and wildlife enthusiasts Chris Hemsworth and Elsa Pataky.

Aussie Ark also began construction on two new facilities - Turtle Ark and Frog Ark. The facilities will form "Conservation Ark" which will be accessible by the public at the Australian Reptile Park in Somersby NSW. The facilities will protect 3 species of turtle and 6 species of amphibians, with the aims of breeding the animals for rewilding. The programs will act as a headstart for the animals and remove the threat of feral predators.





TEAM IN THE FIELD

The Aussie Ark team is made up of passionate and committed individuals who are focused on delivering positive outcomes for Australia's unique wildlife. The animals under our care at Aussie Ark are maintained to an extremely high level, thanks to the dedication of our team on the ground in the Barrington Tops.

The 2020-2021 financial year saw our team spend a great deal of time in our wildlife sanctuaries monitoring and surveying the wildlife. This included surveys of our newest property Mongo valley Wildlife Sanctuary in Upper Mongogarie.

The team also spent hours snorkelling in our river systems to find and bring into protection Hunter River and Manning River turtles. The process is time and labour intensive, as every turtle is caught by hand, to ensure the highest possible standards are maintained.

WILDLIFE

Since 2011, Aussie Ark has vowed to protect endangered species from extinction and has been doing so with the utmost passion and dedication for our native wildlife. With a vision of providing a long-term future to our threatened native wildlife, Aussie Ark became one of NSW's biggest sanctuaries, as well as Australia's largest mainland breeding facility for the Tasmanian devil.

Previously named Devil Ark, Aussie Ark built its success off its breeding program for the endangered Tasmanian devil. Afflicted by a deadly disease, the Tasmanian Devil Facial Tumor Disease (DFTD), the species' population is decreasing at an unprecedented rate and without Aussie Ark intervention, this iconic animal could disappear forever. Over the years, Aussie Ark staff have bred a genetically diverse insurance population and have welcomed hundreds of strong and healthy joeys into the program. This year, 157 joeys were born into the program, including 34 born in the Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary.

Since 2017 Aussie Ark has expanded its umbrella of protection to encompass other endangered native Australian species. Those species are: Eastern quoll, Southern-brown bandicoot, Parma wallaby, Brushtailed rock-wallaby, Long-nosed potoroo and Rufous bettong. Since European settlement, all of those species' populations have undergone a significant decline in abundance. Threats such as habitat fragmentation

and predation from feral pests including cats, foxes and pigs, are leading many native species towards extinction. In the last 12 months, Aussie Ark has again expanded and begun to work with three turtle species; the Manning River Turtle, bell's River Turtle and Hunter River Turtle, as well as six amphibian species.

The Eastern quoll breeding program is, year after year, delivering a significant growth when it comes to the species insurance population. During the 2021 breeding season, Aussie Ark welcomed 73 Eastern quoll joeys. Of these 73, 27 were born in the Barrington Wildlife Sanctuary following the release of Eastern quolls in 2020.

During the 2021 breeding season, Aussie Ark embraced the arrival of 3 Southern-brown bandicoot joeys. Of the estimated 12 species of bandicoots in Australia, approximately half are now extinct, threatened with extinction or extremely rare. As an ecosystem engineer, its survival is paramount. Bandicoots help aerate soil and leaf litter assisting in natural litter breakdown, penetration of seedlings, organic mixing, thus improving nutrient availability for plants. In addition, they help spread fungi through the

ecosystem, which assist plants to increase nutrient absorption.

Aussie Ark's Parma wallaby's insurance population has been thriving and going. Due to many threats faced by Parma wallabies, their range has been confined to the wet sclerophyll forests of Southern New South Wales. Aussie Ark's breeding program for the Parma wallaby is set up to ensure the protection of the species well into the future and this breeding season we saw the birth of 10 wallabies.

Brush-tailed rock-wallabies were deeply affected by the 19/20 bushfire disaster and their status was thrust into the limelight. Aussie Ark was already working with the species prior to the bushfires crisis, however following the further decline of the species Aussie Ark was able to double our holding capacity at the Ark, through the development of new breeding facilities. As such this year Aussie Ark welcomed the birth 3 Brush-tailed Rock-wallaby joeys. As the new facilities come to completion we hope to see a growth in this population.

The Long-nosed potoroo is one of the smallest and most ancient members of the kangaroo family and have remained relatively unchanged for around 10 million vears. Once widespread along the East coast of Australia, the species holds a great importance as an ecosystem engineer. As a species they contribute to the health of the Aussie Ark wild sanctuaries by promoting underground fungal growth to benefit a range of fauna and flora species within the fenced areas. This financial year, Aussie Ark welcomed 24 Longnosed potoroo joeys. Those joeys are part of the next generation of individuals to further the survival of their species.

The Rufous bettong insurance population is guaranteed by Aussie Ark's breeding program. With an increase every year, the Rufous bettong population grew further with the addition of 18 joeys into the program. Suffering

from the effects of many threats like the expansion of agricultural land, Rufous Bettongs have suffered significant declines in their natural distribution. As a means to preserve the species, Aussie Ark is protecting wild areas inhabited by this species by removing or managing stock and feral herbivores, conserving native vegetation, managing fire and controlling feral predators.

The Manning River turtle is one of Aussie Ark's newest species. Following the construction of the first-ever breeding facility for the species, Aussie Ark staff have collected in the field numerous Manning River turtle individuals to start Aussie Ark's long awaited Manning River turtle breeding program. Additionally, Aussie Ark staff spent many hours in the field locating Hunter River turtles, with Bell's River turtles to be completed next.

Aussie Ark aims to diversify its species within the next years and its staff is working tirelessly to put into action many other projects so as to prevent any other native species from flying under our conservation radar, including the Broad-toothed rat, Squirrel Glider, Broad-headed snake and so many more.

SITE REHABILITATION

For many years now, Aussie Ark has waged a war on the Scotch Broom, a highly invasive and noxious introduced weed that has taken over 10,000ha in the Barrington Tops. Introduced by the European settlers to Australia, Scotch Broom thrives in cooler conditions and forms a dense group of bushes.

The march of Scotch Broom poses a significant threat to the future of many endangered species, including terrestrial orchids and other specialized plants in the highlands. If not controlled, the weed can modify native ecosystems by increasing the frequency and intensity of fire, changing vegetation structure, altering soil chemistry

and providing harbour for invasive animals.

The removal of the noxious weed has been a major focus for the Aussie Ark team. In the 2020-2021 financial year, Aussie Ark has been working to remove approximately 37 hectares of Scotch Broom using an intensive multi-faceted management plan involving herbicide spraying and the cut and painting method. This method consists of cutting the broom at the base and applying poison to the stem immediately. Whilst this manual handling is labour intensive, the result is wonderful and longer-lasting than most other techniques.

CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT

The 2020 - 2021 financial year saw some huge developments happen both onsite at Aussie Ark in the Barrington Tops and the development of projects in Somersby NSW at the Australian Reptile Park.

Following the Bushfire disaster of 2019 - 2020, Aussie Ark were able to construct 7 new state of the art enclosures for endangered Brushtailed Rock-wallabies. The new development will allow Aussie Ark to double the onsite population and increase breeding capabilities for return to wild.

Construction has also begun on breeding facilities for Spottedtail quolls. This species is local to the Barrington Tops region, however, declines in species numbers have been monitored over the years. Aussie Ark program will mimic the success of the Eastern quoll breeding program and will aim to breed and rewild this critical species.

'Conservation Ark' facilities at the Australian Reptile Park are finalised with facilities for the Manning River turtle extended and new facilities constructed for the Stuttering and Giant Barred frog. These facilities are the first to be on show at the Australian Reptile Park, helping to bring conservation to the community!


MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS

During the 2020-2021 Financial Year, aussieark.org.au recorded 92,861 users – a decrease of 14% compared to the previous financial year. It is important to note though that in the previous financial year we saw an increase in users by over 400%. An increase in returning visitors was documented, going from 11.4% to 12.7%. WEBSITE USERS PER MONTH:




SOCIAL MEDIA



The financial report covers Australia's Wildlife Ark Incorporated as an individual entity. Australia's Wildlife Ark Incorporated is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 30 June 2021 were an animal preservation project based near the Barrington Tops of New South Wales, Australia. The project has expanded to include species such as the Tasmanian Devil, Koalas, the Manning River Turtle, Eastern Quolls and the Brush-tailed Rock Wallaby.

The functional and presentation currency of Australia's Wildlife Ark Incorporated is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Management committee on 20 January 2022.

1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.*

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue and other income

Grant revenue

Grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating.

Rental income

Investment property revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Amounts are recognised when the amounts of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that the future economic benefit will flow to the entity.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Association is entitled to it. Amounts are recognised when the amounts of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that the future economic benefit will flow to the entity.

(b) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(d) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Land and buildings

Land and buildings are measured using the cost model.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the cost model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

Fixed asset class	Depreciation rate
Freehold Land	0%
Site Improvements	3% - 10%
Plant and Equipment	3% - 33%
Motor Vehicles	10%- 25%

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

(e) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(f) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial liabilities

The Association measures all financial liabilities initially at fair value less transaction costs, subsequently financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

The financial liabilities of the Association comprise trade payables and other loans.

(g) Biological assets

The animal collection managed by Australia's Wildlife Ark are recorded in the accounting records at \$1.00 and this is consistent with industry practice.
